## CONCLUSION

## **5.1 Conclusion**

He conveyed a profound spiritual connection to the world through his search for meaning, embodiment of humanistic values, and unwavering hope. While his spirituality may be personal and unique to him, it shines through in his music, his relationships, and his approach to life, inspiring others to find meaning and purpose in their own journeys. His experiences, as documented in *Clouds*, demonstrate the transformational effects of choosing meaning over hopelessness, even in the face of terminal illness. ## **5.2 Recommendation**

There is one of the problems that arises during the process of finding the meaning of life that is defined as existential vacuum. It is a condition when a person shows the excessive boredom in his life (Frankl, 1988: 48). Existential vacuum can happen for several reasons. Pattakos has mentioned that fear is one of the reasons behind this problem (Pattakos, 2008: 90). Asides from freedom of will, will to meaning, and meaning of life, Zach suffered a lot from existential vacuum where he was surrounded by fear. Since this research is focused more on how he managed to realize his will to meaning to gain the meaning of life, future research could conduct qualitative analysis in revealing how fear of death could change people's personality. Besides *Clouds* movie, future researcher could use the memoir *Fly a Little Higher: How God Answered a Mom's Small Prayer in a Big Way* written by Zach Sobiech's mother to enrich the analysis.
